Ponderings

When I was a boy, I used to walk with two of my friends who had an afternoon paper route (i.e., newspaper route!). It was a time to ‘hang out’ with friends. When one of them was on vacation with their family I would ‘substitute.’ That meant getting the weekly tips also! That newspaper was the source of our news. If we wanted to ‘watch the news’ we tuned in to one of the three networks. That was it. Getting the news seemed to be simpler not so many decades ago.

Where do you go for your news? There are countless ways to ‘be informed’----countless ways to ‘get the news.’ Is it always ‘just the news’ that we are getting? Are we not getting interpretations, biases, political points of view? I suppose this was always the case. It just seems that the ‘news landscape’ has become so much more partisan and divisive in recent years. The facts, just the facts! Not always easy to get.

How providential that our Holy Father, Pope Francis, just this past Sunday (May 15th) canonized a Dutch priest and journalist who stood his ground against Nazi ideology and paid for it with his life. The example of Blessed Titus Brandsma has prompted many journalists to sign an open letter asking the pope to name this Dutch Carmelite priest as the patron saint of journalists.

The present patron saint of journalists and writers is St. Francis De Sales. The journalists do not want to negate or disparage any of the virtues of this saint who died in 1567, but they want to recognize that Blessed Titus as a journalist in the modern age is a worthy patron for journalists of our time. The journalists wrote to the pope, “We, Catholic journalists, recognize in Titus Brandsma a professional peer and fellow believer of considerable standing. Someone who shared the deeper mission that should drive journalism in modern times: a search for truth and veracity, the promotion of peace and dialogue between people.”

Journalists face many challenges in the present age. According to a report by UNESCO published in January, 55 journalist and media professionals were killed in 2021. Two-thirds of those killed, the report said, ‘died in countries where there is no armed conflict.’

The new saint, now St. Titus Brandsma, lived from 1881-1943 when he was killed by lethal injection at the concentration camp of Dachau, Germany---the first camp established by the Nazi regime. Born to a humble, devout Catholic family in rural Frisia, in northern Netherlands, he became a Carmelite priest and teacher. He was known as an intellectual and a resistor to the Nazi occupation. He was well respected in the circles of academia and journalism. He was arrested in January of 1942 and was put to death on July 26th of the same year. The new saint said of his imprisonment, “Blessed loneliness, I find myself in this cell as in my own home. So far, I have not been bored at all, on the contrary. I am alone, that’s true, but the Lord is closer to me than ever.” He continues in his diary, “I feel like shouting for joy because the Lord wanted me to discover Him in all his fullness, without needing to be in the midst of people, or for them to come here. He is my only refuge. I feel happy. I will stay here forever if He commands it. Few times have I felt so happy.” What truly amazing sentiments---from his prison cell!

St. Titus Brandsma founded schools and taught at the Catholic University of Nijmegen, where he served as the rector in 1932. The postulator for his canonization, Fr. Millan Romerai, O. Carm., had this to say about him, “He is a Christian martyr because he realized that Nazism was a sort of ‘neo-paganism,’ the idolatry of race, nationalism, power, arrogance. Faced with this model, he proposed the Christian model as the only truthful one.” In his inaugural address as rector of the University St. Titus Brandsma said, “Among the many questions I ask myself, none worries me more than the enigma of why it is that man, who finds ways of development and feels proud of his achievements, turns away from God in such a remarkable way.”

As a journalist he published many articles. He founded a newspaper and was a ‘spiritual father’ to many of his fellow journalists. The straw that ‘broke the camel’s back’ was a letter he published in which he called the Nazi’s forced expulsion of Jewish children from Catholic schools a ‘flagrant injustice’ and an ‘attack on the mission of the Church itself.’ He wrote, “The Church, in carrying out its mission, knows no distinction of sex, race or nation.”

While in prison, many spoke of his kindness, charity, and spiritual support. The camp nurse who injected him with carbolic acid would later, based on his example, abandon Nazi ideology and convert to Catholicism.

St. Titus Brandsma, saint for our time, saint for all journalists, Pray for Us!
