Ponderings

This week's "Ponderings" column is a 'potpourri' or 'smorgasbord'---three topics united only by the theme that all that is described happens during the month of January!

CATHOLIC SCHOOLS WEEK

Catholic Schools Week is an annual initiative led by the National Catholic Educational Association (NCEA) to celebrate the excellence and impact of Catholic schools. Each year, Catholic schools observe the celebration through a variety of activities, emphasizing the importance of Catholic education. The theme for this year's Catholic Schools Week, which runs from January 29-February 4, is: "Catholic Schools: Faith, Excellence, Service." Our Catholic Schools are places where faith is celebrated, where excellence in encouraged and service to others is a priority. I suspect that those three words capture the reasons why so many families choose a Catholic School education for their children. In the United States there are 1,835,376 students enrolled in Catholic Schools in this present academic year. We are grateful for the rich history of Catholic School education in the Diocese of Providence. The first Catholic School in the United States was in 1783 in Philadelphia. Yes, Catholic Schools have a long history in our country. We offer our support and encouragement to the elementary and secondary Catholic Schools in our local area----where a number of our families send their children.

CHRISTIAN UNITY

Every year during the month of January, there is a "Week of Prayer for Christian Unity". This year the week is January 18-25th. The theme is "Do good; seek justice"---which is taken from the Book of the Prophet Isaiah 1:17. It reflects the prophet's concern for the oppressed who suffer from injustice and inequality fed by hypocrisy that leads to disunity. He teaches that God requires righteousness and justice from all of us, to create the peace and unity that God desires. I found a couple of interesting examples of ecumenical activity that has taken place in recent months. The first: Pope Francis decided to give the Greek Orthodox archbishop of Athens, His Beatitude Ieronymos II, three fragments of Parthenon sculptures that have been kept in the Vatican Museums for centuries. He is doing this as "a concrete sign of a sincere desire to continue on the ecumenical journey of witness to the truth." When the two leaders met in Athens last year Pope Francis apologized for past actions and decisions by the Catholic Church "that had little or nothing to do with Jesus and the Gospel, but were instead marked by a thirst for advantage and power and gravely weakened our communion." The second: In ecumenical discussions at the Lambeth Conference in Canterbury, England, last August, Justin Welby, archbishop of Canterbury, has said that most Anglicans recognize the pope as "the father of the Church in the West." The Lambeth Conference brings together more than 600 bishops representing Christian communities from the Anglican Communion for a program of lectures and discussions on a range of topics.

MARTIN LUTHER KING, JR. REMEMBRANCE

On January 16th we celebrated the holiday in remembrance of Dr. Martin Luther King. You may have seen the large memorial statue "The Embrace" that was unveiled recently on the Boston Common. The bronze, 20-foot tall and 40-foot wide sculpture is the largest monument in the country dedicated to racial equity. The sculpture symbolizes the hug King shared with his wife after he won the Nobel Peace Prize in 1964 and celebrates their time together in Boston. The couple met while he was getting his doctorate at Boston University and she was at the New England Conservatory. One of the Kings' first dates was on the Boston Common. So many of Dr. King's quotes are worth our reflection---in our own day. He wrote, "I have decided to stick with love. Hate is too great a burden to bear." And this one: "We may have all come on different ships, but we're in the same boat now." We do need to reflect on that which unites us and the call to express love, not hate or violence or death.
